Sixth Series of PCORIsponsored Community Engagement Meetings Focuses on Healthful Diets

The sixth series of PCORI-sponsored Community Engagement Meetings took a delicious twist. Like previous Community Engagement Meetings, much of the meetings emphasized the importance of screening in the prevention and control of colorectal cancer. But the speaker for this series, Dr. Valencia Martin, did not stop there. Dr. Martin, a family practice physician who runs the Greenwood Comprehensive Medical Clinic in Greenwood, knows the importance of diet in the prevention of colorectal cancers. Using the language of faith for the second part of her presentation, Dr. Martin discussed dietary components that can either REDUCE the risk of CRC or INCREASE the risk of CRC. A diet rich in fresh fruits and vegetables, as illustrated by the appetizing lunch served at the Cleveland meeting (shown in the accompanying photo) is an important part of an overall strategy to reduce

Great news! According to reliable sources in the Mississippi Department of Revenue, all County Tax Collector's Offices have received the pre-ordered CRC specialty automotive license plates. Individuals in several counties are already sporting their new car tags around town. If you pre-ordered a CRC car tag but you haven't been notified to collect it, call your County Tax Collector's Office located at your county seat. Remember, these license plates won't be mailed to you; you must collect them in person.

As Dr. Martin also pointed out, unhealthy diets containing processed meats and red meat, especially charred red meat arising from poor grilling technique, is known to increase the risk of colorectal cancers. Saturday morning meetings were held in churches in the Mississippi Delta. Vessel of Mercy Church hosted the March 11th meeting in Greenville; Lincoln Garden Church of Christ hosted the March 25th meeting in Cleveland. Two Mississippians Call on (Back to Top) Congress

Dr. Sam Pace and Dr. Roy J. Duhe participated in the 2017 Call on Congress hosted by Fight CRC. The first two days (March 13th & 14th) provided opportunities to share information with approximately 150 other participants gathered from all parts of the nation, to learn about emerging scientific and public health issues in colorectal cancer, and to gain a deeper

understanding of the policy issues to be discussed. The main event was on Wednesday, March 15th, when participants met with their Congressmen. The two Mississippians met with the staff of Senator Thad Cochran and Senator Roger Wicker, and with the staff of Representative Gregg Harper and Representative Trent Kelly. Because neither Dr. Pace nor Dr. Duhe live in the 4th District nor the 2nd District, they were not scheduled to meet with Representative Steven Palazzo or Representative Bennie Thompson. While dropping off information packages to these offices, Pace and Duhe had a surprise encounter with Congressman Thompson, and quickly seized the opportunity to discuss CRC policy issues. Another chance encounter occurred when Representative Rodney Davis (13th District, Illinois) recognized the anti-CRC T-shirts and chatted with the pair in the hallway near Congressman Kelly's office. Rep. Davis has a strong personal connection to colorectal cancer and personally appreciates the value of colonoscopies, and was happy to pose for a picture (follow @70x2020Guy on Twitter to see more photos from the event). Here are the policy requests made during Call on Congress 2017:

- 1) Co-sponsor the Removing Barriers to Colorectal Cancer Screening Act, HR 1017/S.479. This was an easy request for the Mississippi duo, because Senator Roger Wicker is one of the four original co-authors of S479. As of this writing, Senator Thad Cochran also co-sponsored S479, and Representative Gregg Harper is currently the only Mississippi Representative to have co-sponsored the House version (HR1017). Last year the entire Mississippi congressional delegation signed the previous versions of these bills.
- 2) Protect 100% insurance coverage for colorectal cancer (CRC) screening in the Affordable Care Act (ACA) replacement legislation.
- 3) Appropriate \$70 million for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Colorectal Cancer Control Program (CRCCP) to provide states with the necessary funding to increase colorectal cancer screening rates in all 50 states.
- 4) Appropriate funding for 21st Century Cures as part of the FY 2017 federal budget and increase funding for the National Institutes of Health (NIH) to \$34.5 billion, including \$5.9 billion for the National Cancer Institute (NCI) for FY 2017.
- 5) Fund the DoD PRCRP at \$60 million for FY 2017. Ensure colorectal cancer research continues to be included as eligible for funding under this program.

6) Protect the Affordable Care Act's (ACA) ban on pre-existing condition limitations, elimination of annual and lifetime coverage caps, and maintain coverage of screening services and guaranteed renewability.

North Mississippi Medical Center recently held the third annual Run for Your Buns 5K and the second annual Blue Tie Affair in honor of Colon Cancer Awareness Month.

The Blue Tie Affair, a formal event held in downtown Tupelo, featured live music, dinner, a silent auction and brief comments from a local colon cancer survivor. The event outgrew the venue used in the first year – increasing from less than 150 attendees to almost 400.

The Run for Your Buns 5K was also well attended, showing an increase in participants and sponsors. Tupelo Mayor Jason Shelton spoke after the race, sharing about his mother's battle with colon cancer. In addition, FIT tests were handed out to those who qualified.

Both events raise awareness of colon cancer and the need for screening. Funds raised benefit the NMMC Cancer Care Fund. These funds are used to help local cancer patients in need with costs associated with battling cancer, including medication, nutritional supplements, transportation assistance and other necessities.

In recognition of these events and Colon Cancer Awareness Month, Tupelo's City Hall is illuminated in blue during March.

On Saturday, March 25th, GI Associates continued its annual "GiveBack" tradition of providing free colonoscopies to individuals who are otherwise unable to afford them. At this year's event, 42 participants received free screening colonoscopies at GI Associates' Flowood and Vicksburg facilities. Thirty-four free screening colonoscopies were provided in Flowood and eight were provided in Vicksburg. GI Associates, like many other gastroenterology clinics throughout Mississippi, was a major contributor to the success of the CRC car tag drive.
