Service:

The MAC Center is a welcoming and accessible place located in Jackson, Mississippi, where people can obtain unbiased information and assistance in locating services and supports. The MAC Center provides a central source of reliable and objective information about a broad range of programs and services. The MAC Center also helps people understand and evaluate the various options available to them regardless of income or eligibility for publicly funded long-term care.

The MAC Center Specialists provide assistance within the local center, over the telephone, within a person's home, or in another convenient location. All assistance is free and confidential.

<u>Service</u>: The Central Mississippi Area Agency on Aging Reassurance Program is provided by the Central Mississippi Planning and Development District (CMPDD), Central MS Area Agency on Aging, and The MAC Center, and seeks to meet the special needs of people who are elderly or physically challenged and living alone by placing a regular phone call at a pre-arranged time.

Calls are made to:

- Check on the client's well-being.
- o Affirm that someone does care by sharing a few minutes in friendly conversation.
- Provide emergency follow-up.

Medicaid Waiver Program

Home and Community Based Elderly and Disabled Waiver Program

Agency: Central Mississippi Planning and Development District (CMPDD)

<u>Service</u>: The State of Mississippi Division of Medicaid and Central Mississippi Planning and Development District (CMPDD) provides home and community-based services to individuals who are at risk or would require the level of care found in a nursing facility called the Elderly & Disabled Medicaid Waiver Program.

<u>Services Include</u>: Homemaker services, in-home respite services, institutional respite, adult day care, unlimited home health visits, home-delivered meals, and escorted transportation. All costs for services are reimbursable to an approved provider and all services must be approved by the Division of Medicaid.

<u>Area of Accessibility</u>: Copiah, Hinds, Madison, Rankin, Simpson, Warren, and Yazoo counties in Central Mississippi

Eligibility criteria:

- Beneficiaries must be 21 years of age or older;
- Persons qualify by either SSI or 300% of SSI
- Beneficiaries must score 50 or above on the Medicaid Long Term Care Pre-Admission Screening (PAS) instrument.
- Person must require nursing facility level of care, if assistance is not provided.

A registered nurse and a licensed social worker visit the client on a monthly basis. The registered nurse and licensed social worker, working together as a professional team, must conduct the initial, then yearly assessment to assure that the client qualifies for the program.

Bridge to Independence

Bridge to Independence is a Northeast Mississippi Planning and Development District (NEMPDD) program that assists individuals who wish to move from qualified institutions to homes in the community. NEMPDD will provide you with a Community Navigator that will help plan and implement a move to the community and coordinate community based support and services such as, Attendant Care, Transportation, Life Skills Training, Caregiver Support, Peer Counseling, and Safety Planning.

Financial assistance will be available for the following areas; Durable Medical Equipment, Security and Utility Deposits, Household Furnishings and Goods, Moving Expenses, Home Modifications for Accessibility, and Therapy such as Physical, Occupational, and Speech. Transition services are available for 365 days following discharge from a qualified facility. After that, individuals will continue to receive Medicaid Waiver.

<u>Agency</u>: Northeast Mississippi Planning and Development District (NEMPDD)

<u>Area of accessibility</u>: Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo counties of Northeast Mississippi

Eligibility criteria:

- 65 years or older
- Must have a physical, mental developmental, or intellectual disability
- Qualify for transitioning back into a home or community from a qualified institution
- Live in Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo counties of Northeast Mississippi

Veterans Administration Resources

Respite (In home/inpatient)

<u>Service</u>: Give Caregivers temporary relief from the demands of daily care and support the Veteran's desire to stay in their home and delay or even prevent nursing home placement. Eligible Veteran's receive 30 days of Respite in a calendar year.

Eligibility Criteria: Applicants must meet one of the listed criteria presented below.

Criteria 1 - Applicants show 3 or more ADL dependencies

Criteria 2 - A significant cognitive impairment accompanied with 2 ADL dependencies and 2 of the following:

- Dependent in 3 or more IADLs
- Recently discharged from a nursing home
- At least 75 years old
- 3 or more hospitalizations in the last year
- Diagnosed with Clinical Depression
- Lives alone in the Community

Respite Programs:

Home Health Aide Services or Home Health Aide Program

<u>Service</u>: A home health aide will spend 3-4 hours at a time with an eligible applicant 2 to 3 times per week. Services include bathing, dressing, or other activities of daily living. <u>Referral</u>: Consult "NON VA CARE GEC NON-SKILLED HOME HEALTH AIDE"

Home Respite

<u>Service</u>: An aid will visit with the eligible veteran in their home for up to 6 hours at a time. A maximum of 15 visits in a 6 month period.

Referral: Consult- "NON VA CARE GEC RESPITE HOME"

In patient Respite

<u>Service</u>: The duration of services is 30 days per calendar year in either CLC or a Contract Nursing Home. Contract Nursing Home Respite Stays have a 10 day trial period in which the caregiver must remain in town and be able to pick up the Veteran if Inpatient Respite is not an appropriate fit for the Veteran.

Referral: "EC INPT RESPITE CARE" consult Eligibility criteria:

- Veteran must be medically and psychiatrically stable
- 30 days prior to admission, Veteran must have an H&P, labs, TB test, and chest x-ray.

Contract Adult Day Health Care

<u>Service</u>: 2 to 5 days per week at Gulf Shores Adult Day Care Biloxi *Gulf Shores Adult Day Care program provides the following:*

- Transportation to and from home
- Activities such as Bingo
- Medication Management while at the facility
- Bathing assistance
- RN nursing care
- Appropriate supervision for Veterans with Dementia.

<u>Referral</u>: Consult-"NON VA CARE GEC ADULT DAY CARE" (Biloxi VA GCVHCS. Station Memorandum No. 11E-30-15, 2015)

Home Based Primary Care

<u>Service</u>: Primary Care Services provided in the home by the HBPC team. <u>Eligibility criteria</u>:

- Primarily homebound, bedridden, or terminally ill
- Unable to make clinical visits without excessively taxing effort
- Live within a 60-mile radius of Biloxi VA, the JACC, or MOPC

<u>Referral</u>: Consult "EC OUTPT HOME BASED PRIMARY CARE" (Biloxi VA GCVHCS. Station Memorandum No. 11E-10-15, 2015)

Medical Foster Homes

<u>Service</u>: "Non-institutional alternative for appropriate chronically-ill and terminally-ill veterans who wish to live in a community setting, but lack the social support needed to remain in their own homes.

(Biloxi VA GCVHCS. Station Memorandum No. 11E-10-15, 2015)

Eligibility

- Requires Supervision
- Free from alcohol or illicit drugs
- Free of communicable disease
- Medically and Psychiatrically stable

Apply for service:

- Must enroll in HBPC
- Medical Clearance from the director of HBPC

Referral: Consult: "EC INPT MEDICAL FOSTER HOME PROGRAM"

VA Long Term Care

<u>Service</u>: "VA is authorized to provide nursing home care to all Veterans who need such care and who meet the minimum length of service requirement."

Eligibility criteria: VA is mandated to provide Long Term Care (LTC) Benefits to Veterans who:

- Require LTC due to a service-connected disability
- Require LTC and have a service-connected disability rated at 70 percent or more.

VA supports institutional extended care in three venues:

Community Living Centers (requires 70% Service Connection or higher) Services:

- Memory Care Unit
- Long Term Care
- Short Stay Rehab
- Inpatient Hospice

- Long Term Care: Consult "EC BILOXI VA LONG TERM CARE/COMMUNITY LIVING CENTER INPT"
- Short Stay Rehab: "EC BILOXI VA SHORT STAY REAHB INPT"
- Memory Care: "EC BILOXI VA LONG TERM DEMENTIA CARE/COMMUNITY LIVING CENTER INPT"
- Inpatient Hospice: "EC INPT HOSPICE CARE FACILITY"

Fees:

- Vary by state
- The veteran does not have to have a Service Connection but those with a 70% Service Connection or greater do not have copayments or fees.

VA Hospice

Eligibility criteria:

- Ability to speak limited to approximately ≤ 6 intelligible different words in the course of an average day or in the course of an intensive interview.
- Speech ability is limited to the use of a single intelligible word in an average day or in the course of an intensive interview
- Ambulatory ability is lost (cannot walk without personal assistance.)
- Cannot sit up without assistance
- Loss of ability to smile.
- Loss of ability to hold up head independently
- One or more of the following conditions in the 12 months:
- Aspiration pneumonia
- Pyelonephritis
- Septicemia
- Multiple pressure ulcers (stage 3-4)
- Recurrent Fever
- Other significant condition that suggests a limited prognosis
- Inability to maintain sufficient fluid and calorie intake in the past 6months (10% weight loss or albumin < 2.5 gm/dl)

American Veterans Aid & Attendance Benefit

<u>Service</u>: The Department of Veteran Affairs offers a special benefit to war era veterans and their surviving spouses called Aid and Attendance.

This is a tax-free benefit designed to provide financial assistance to help cover the cost of long-term care in the home, in an assisted living facility or in a nursing home.

This Benefit is for those veterans and surviving spouses who require the regular attendance of another person or caregiver in at least two of the daily activities of living such as bathing, dressing, eating, toileting, and transferring.

Benefit Table: All benefits are Tax Free

Status	Monthly Benefit
Surviving Spouse	\$1,228 Monthly/ \$14,742 Annually
Single Veteran	\$1,911 Monthly/ \$22,939 Annually
Married Veteran	\$2,266 Monthly/ \$27,195 Annually
Two Vets Married	\$3,032 Monthly/ \$36,387 Annually

Eligibility criteria:

Requirements

- Must have served at least 90 days of active duty with at least one day during a period of war.
- Must have anything other than a Dishonorable discharge.
- A surviving spouse must have been married to the veteran at the time of his passing.
- Must require the assistance of another person to perform some of the daily activities of living.
- Must meet income and countable asset criteria established by the VA.
- Must be 65 years and older or totally disabled.

Eligible Periods of War:

- World War II: December 7, 1941 December 31, 1946, inclusive. If the veteran was in service on December 31, 1946, continuous service before July 26, 1947, is considered World War II service.
- Korean conflict: June 27, 1950 January 31, 1955, inclusive.
- Vietnam era: The period beginning on February 28, 1961, and ending on May 7, 1975, inclusive, in the case of a veteran who served in the Republic of Vietnam during that period. The period beginning on August 5, 1964, and ending on May 7, 1975,

inclusive, in all other cases. (Note: From February 28, 1961 to Aug 4, 1964, vet must have boots on the ground.)

 Persian Gulf War: August 2, 1990, through date to be prescribed by Presidential proclamation or law.

DisentangleAD Grant Opportunity

Service:

Mississippi Respite Voucher Program

Service:

Through a grant to the Mississippi Department of Human Services (MDHS), funds were approved to provide respite care vouchers to eligible family caregivers. These vouchers may be used to pay an in-home care agency, and Adult Day Center, or a private individual to provide respite care. Vouchers are provided in the amount of \$200.00 per household to approved family caregivers.

<u>Area of accessibility</u>: Statewide

Mississippi caregivers providing unpaid care for a dependent person of any age with a significant disability, or chronic illness requiring 24/7 care.

Home Instead Grant Opportunity

Service:

Home Instead offers home care grants to those providing care to their loved ones living with Alzheimer's disease or other dementias.

There are two grant options:

- 1. Recharge Respite Grant
 - A one-time grant of 50 hours of respite care to be used within 3 months.
- 2. Extended Relief Respite Grant
 - A six-month grant of 25 hours of respite care per week for six months.

The purpose of the Housing Rehabilitation Program is to improve the livability of a home, to extend its life for a minimum of 10 years, and to meet the current minimum building

codes, whenever possible. Major emphasis is given to housing problems affecting safety and health (such as gas leaks, outdated and hazardous electrical wiring, and plumbing).

The actual amount of repairs needed will be determined from an inspection and evaluation of the home. This type of assistance can vary depending on the needs in a home; however, not all homes can be repaired. If the home has too many major problems, it may not qualify for our regular housing rehab/repair program, but we may be able to help with emergency repair(s) for safety reasons.

Funeral/Burial Assistance

Burial assistance is limited in Mississippi and the best way to cope with the cost of burial or cremation is to plan ahead with a pre-paid funeral or through a burial or life insurance policy that will cover the cost. Social Security does provide a one-time benefit of \$255.00 to the surviving spouse or dependents of the deceased, but this requires application through Social Security.

The Veterans Administration will pay a burial allowance for a non-service connected death of \$300.00 and a service connected death of up to \$2,000.00. These benefits require application through the Veteran's Administration.

If a Mississippi resident dies without the ability or resources to pay for a funeral or cremation and there is no family to pay, the obligation then becomes the responsibility of the county coroner in the county where the person resided. How the coroner provides this service varies from coroner to coroner, some may bury in a pauper's cemetery while others may offer cremation services. The county coroner may be of assistance to families who are unable to manage final expenses.

FEMA Funeral Assistance Program

<u>Service</u>: Under the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act of 2021 and the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, FEMA is providing financial assistance for COVID-19 related funeral expenses incurred on or after January 20, 2020.

Eligibility: To be eligible for COVID-19 funeral assistance, the policy states:

- The applicant must be a U.S. citizen, non-citizen national, or qualified alien who incurred funeral expenses after Jan. 20, 2020 for a death attributed to COVID-19.
- If multiple individuals contributed toward funeral expenses, they should apply under a single application as applicant and co-applicant. FEMA will also consider documentation from other individuals not listed as the applicant and co-applicant who may have incurred funeral expenses as part of the registration for the deceased individual.
- An applicant may apply for multiple deceased individuals.
- The COVID-19-related death must have occurred in the United States, including the U.S. territories and the District of Columbia.
- This assistance is limited to a maximum financial amount of \$9,000 per funeral and a maximum of \$35,500 per application.
- Funeral assistance is intended to assist with expenses for funeral services and interment or cremation.

Service: Adult Protective Services Program

Adult Protective Services investigates reports of abuse, neglect, self-neglect, and exploitation of vulnerable adults in the home setting. The purpose of the investigation is to determine the validity of the report and to assess the need for protective services. Services from the agency are intended to preserve the vulnerable person's rights to a least restrictive setting while maintaining his or her well-being.

Service Area: Statewide

<u>Eligibility</u>: The vulnerable person must meet the definition of a vulnerable person according to the Mississippi Vulnerable Persons Act.
