

## CHILD AND ADOLESCENT PSYCHIATRIST

The Department of Psychiatry and Human Behavior at the University of Mississippi Medical Center (UMMC) is actively recruiting a board-certified/eligible child and adolescent psychiatrist. The department's threefold mission is to provide high quality care to all patients; to offer state-of-the-art education and training in medicine, psychiatry, psychology and related fields; and to pursue research on the brain, human behavior and mental illness.

The candidate would be expected to provide clinical services (possibilities exist in inpatient, outpatient, consultation-liaison, and emergency, psychiatry) and to participate in the teaching and training mission of the division. In addition, there are opportunities to conduct research within the department and to collaborate with other departments across the UMMC campus.

Jackson is the capital city of Mississippi, a state with a rich cultural history that has greatly influenced the music, literature, and art of the rest of the world. It lies at a midpoint between Memphis and New Orleans, each of which is an easy three-hour drive, and Atlanta and Dallas, each about seven hours away. Barnett Reservoir provides ample local recreation opportunities and the Gulf of Mexico is less than three hours to the south. Ethnic, music, and culinary festivals abound during pleasant spring and fall weather.
